### Problematic

Children and young people at risk due to psychological vulnerability as a result of evictions from homes

### Intervention Proposal

Financial support to cover rental expenses and household utility bills for families with children and adolescents in the United States of America

### Justification

To get closer to the problem that many people who live in the United States are currently facing, it is necessary to know the following information presented by CNN in Spanish:

Millions of tenants like Leonard are at risk of eviction as the clock ticks. More than 3 million people said they would likely be evicted "in the next two months," according to a census survey conducted in early July, and nearly 5 million tenants said they will not be able to pay their August rent, according to the same survey.

From the above, it is necessary to specify that of the 5 million tenants at least half live with children and adolescents, which can lead to problems in the future for the country, since a child or young person who has to go through an eviction psychologically suffers the fact of insecurity that emanates from not having a home or shelter. Later that child or young person may be a potential criminal or drug addict, since the negative psychological impacts motivate violent, impulsive, even destructive behaviors.

That is why we proposed to take an action plan with an economic component under a humanitarian approach to the neediest people in the United States of America with the aim of reducing the psychological impact caused by an eviction, especially in homes made up of children and young people.
